Orange Family History Group Receives Community Award

Members of the Orange Family History Group were delighted to be honoured with a Community Achievement Award at the Mayoral Dinner to celebrate 150 years of Local Government in Orange on Saturday 7 August 2010. The Award was presented in recognition of the Group's work in safeguarding our past and contributing to the lifestyle of the City. The Orange and District Historical Society were similarly honoured.

The Award is in the form of a sheet of specially minted stamps featuring the Orange 150 years of Local Government 'Leaf' and the Group's own logo. This will be displayed in the Orange City Library where it can be admired by all. Congratulations to all of our members on the dedication which has made this a reality.

We want your stories!

In our last 2 *Newsletters* we've described how the Central West Libraries staff we were building a wiki to record stories about the people, places, events and services that have contributed to 150 years of local government in Orange. This is now live so be sure to check out the site and contribute your information and memories. The wiki will only ever be as useful as the information you supply <http://150wiki.orange.nsw.gov.au>

What sort of information is included on the wiki which is of interest to family historians?

- Under 'Places' we're building an index of the streets in Orange and who they're named after. It's literally a 'who's who' of early settlers. There's also heaps of interesting background information on many public places and buildings in the city.
- The 'People' category is a work in progress where we're gradually listing and adding information about those who have contributed to local

government as elected representatives (Mayors/Aldermen/Councillors) and Council staff. We're really seeking your help here and already we've been rewarded. For example after we launched we were delighted to be sent some information about William Ernest Bouffler from one of his descendants. William was the second Council Clerk for East Orange Municipality from 1895 to 1912, and was Mayor of Orange in 1918-19, having been an Alderman from 1912-1925. The entry also includes photographs.

A reminder too that the *Central Western Daily* is also running an historical, feature article on the 3rd Thursday of each month. In August this will be on gas and electricity. These are being compiled and written by Library staff with research assistance by the Orange and District Historical Society. Orange, A Medical History

– an update

In earlier *Newsletters* we've described how local author, Elisabeth Edwards, has been commissioned to write the publication *Orange, A Medical History* and with her extensive research well in hand, she is now planning and writing out each chapter for the book.

Elisabeth's research included wide ranging newspaper and articles searches, collecting photographs, conducting extensive interviews, photographing artefacts and touring Bloomfield Hospital and new Orange Base Hospital site. Elisabeth has kept the project's steering committee updated on all her efforts and here we highlight two interesting stories.

The publication will be launched in autumn 2011 – we'll keep you posted.

Our first ambulance:

Orange acquired its first motor ambulance in 1925. As early as 1902 a local benefactor gave Orange District Hospital enough money to buy a 'hand ambulance'. This appears to have been a primitive hand-drawn vehicle, which was used for a number of years to transport local patients to the hospital. Its limitation was that part from being very slow, it could not service the large area from which patients travelled to the hospital. Dubbo obtained a horse-drawn ambulance from about 1913, but it appears that Orange never had one. People largely depended on the kindness of relations, friends and neighbours to transport them, often by horse-

drawn sulky or hoisted on a stretcher by a team of fit men. When doctors started buying motor cars, they were frequently called to outlying areas to pick up patients, who would have a rough ride in the back of the vehicle into town. When the town obtained its first motor ambulance it was an immediate success and in a short time a second vehicle was bought. For many years Orange Ambulance Service relied on government grants and subsidies, local subscriptions and fund-raising events to keep it operational.

Our first X-rays:

Orange residents were fascinated by the Rotgen x-rays when they were first discovered in Europe in 1895. By late 1896, Father Joseph Slattery of St Stanislaus College in Bathurst was working on his own experiments with the rays. In no time local people were keen to benefit from the medical applications of the X-rays. Probably the first Orange person to seek an X-ray in Bathurst was young Thomas Leak, who had smashed his ankle some months previously. He had the ankle X-rayed at the college and took the radiographs back to Orange with him, in the hope that they would facilitate surgery. Orange welcomed its first radiologist, Dr Paul Tillett, in 1923 when he established his practice in Anson Street. He made his services freely available to those who could not afford to visit him privately, charging with the patient for Orange District Hospital only for the radiograph itself. Orange District Hospital finally obtained its own X-ray plant in July 1927.

Convict Indexes On State Records' Website

NSW State Records has just combined their six convict indexes into a single database, with around 120,000 entries. As a result you can build up a history of your convict's 'career' in the colony and order copies of the records in a single search. If you prefer, you can still limit your search to a single index. The following indexes can be searched at the same time:

- Certificates of Freedom, 1823-69
- Convict bank accounts, 1837-70
- Tickets of Exemption from Government Labor, 1827-32
- Tickets of Leave, Certificates of Emancipation and Pardons, 1810-19
- Tickets of Leave, 1810-75
- Ticket of Leave Passports, 1835-69

The *index to Tickets of leave, 1810-75*

which was compiled by Dr Perry McIntyre, is one of the six indexes. It is a recent addition to the suite of indexes and State Records acknowledge and thank Dr McIntyre for giving permission to add it to the website. Further convict indexes will be added to this database as

they are completed.

There's gold in them there hills!

Gold is an important part of Orange's history, past and present. A sometimes overlooked index on the State Records' web site is the

The index was compiled by Mrs Kaye Vernon and Mrs Billie Jacobson (their website is www.teapotgenealogy.com). The index is published on State Records' website with the permission of Mrs Vernon and Mrs Jacobson, who also retain the copyright. The index records name of the lease holder, lease number, date of application, location, remarks, series number, reel/item number, and surveyor's name. Typing 'Orange' in the location filed brought up a multitude of entries. The State Records' site also offers some excellent alternative searching strategies for mining records

The Proverbial "Brick Wall"

At last, one of our long standing "brick walls" is starting to crumble. My mother's maternal 'Steward' line has long been a problem. Her paternal 'Laing' line has been pretty well documented, and we've had yearly reunions for more than 30 years, so we have regular updates on it. John, one of my 'Laing/Steward' 1st cousins tried years ago to find a 'Steward' who was interested in the family history, but to no avail.

About 18 months ago two sisters, Judith and Valda (who were descended from Kate Sarah, my grandmother Daisy's sister), decided to try to get in touch with other family members. They remembered that Daisy's only daughter had married a 'Podger'.

It being such an uncommon surname, and so easier to follow up, Judy made some phone calls. She managed to find a Podger who was a cousin of mine, and things started to move. Judy and Valda with their husbands, came to visit us in Orange so that we could meet.

My cousin John and his wife Pam came too and we had a great couple of days, sharing our limited Steward tree with our new found 2nd cousins. We also had lots of fun and many laughs about our childhood days and family memories.

Now would seem to be the time to say that Judy has a mobile phone package that gives her unlimited free calls. This meant that there were lots of calls to the few family members that she had kept in touch with over the years, who of course knew of other family members' whereabouts. It escalated!

Judy and Val came to our 2009 Laing reunion at the end of May. Countless phone calls and emails and frantic additions to our tree, then in July we had our first Steward reunion. We had a large group of family members, most of whom had not met each other before. A lovely warm, friendly day, lunch (bring a dish) and lots of sharing photos, "does anyone know who this is?", and adding information to our embryonic tree, taped up to the long wall in the hall of Judy's house.

Another 12 months has gone by – phone calls from Judy, emails back and forth, sharing documents, photos, certificates etc, and countless hours adding all of this information onto my Family Tree Maker program. We have found many new cousins, even quite a lot of 4th cousins in the Isle of Wight and Sussex, England. We had no idea that they existed just a few months ago! We have even gone back a couple more generations!

Now, here it is, time for our second reunion, with cousins who have now become our friends. This has been just an impossible dream for so many years – it is now a dream that is coming true. This particular “brick wall” has now nearly been demolished, so we will soon have to go on to the next one!
